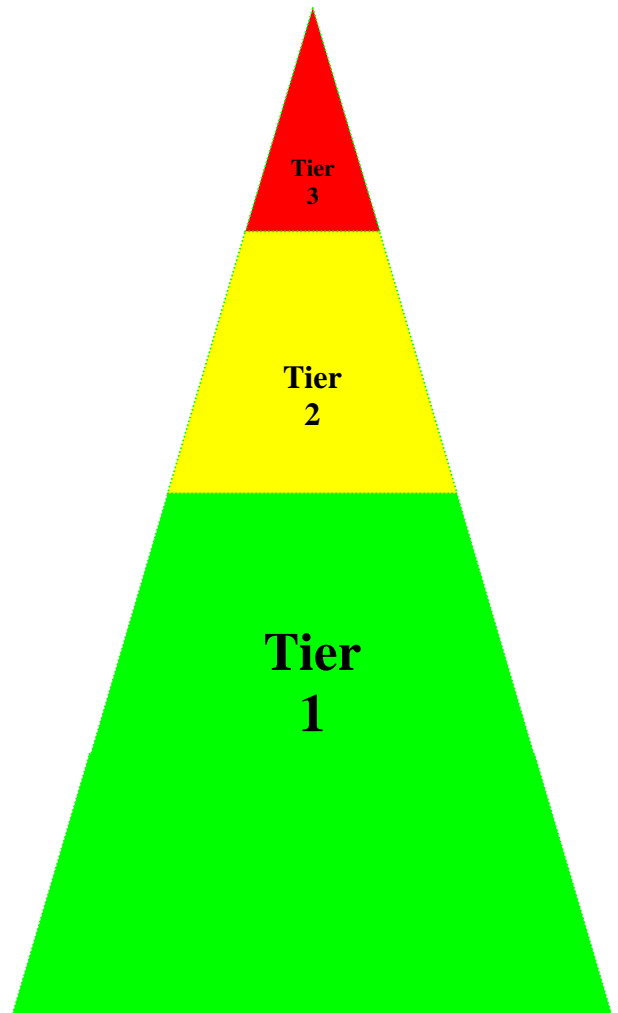

Teach behaviors like we teach academics!

Students will not understand what is expected unless we teach them.

First teachers must have a clear expectation in mind before teaching students the school rules, expected behaviors, and procedures.

Learning Unity West Expectations.

In order for students to learn our expectations, we must teach them. The following is a 5 step guideline to Teaching Expectations.

- 1. Define the Expectations:** Clearly explain what the expectations mean and what the expectations look like in all settings.
- 2. Teach, Model, and Practice the Expectations:** Have students practice, and practice following the expectations in all settings. It is important to point out what each student did well and what each student can improve upon.
- 3. Remind Students of the Expectations:** Remind the students of the expectation by verbally giving pre-corrections or modeling the expected behavior in each setting.
- 4. Celebrate the Students following the Expectations:** Continually and consistently praise the students for following through on what you taught them.
- 5. Re-teach the Expectations:** Continually go over the expectations to begin the day and before activities.

Cool Tools

P.B.I.S. is based on the belief that behaviors must be taught just like academics. We will be teaching a specific behavior or expectation each week. In order to be consistent, every teacher will get a “cool tool” or lesson plan each Friday to teach on the following Monday.

Each month will have a theme, and cool tools will vary from week to week.

Cool Tools only take a short time to teach (approximately 15 minutes). Everyone is expected to teach the lesson on Monday unless otherwise stated on the P.B.I.S. calendar. It would be great if the lesson could be taught before lunch time.

Expectations

Classroom Expectations: All teachers will teach their classroom expectations and procedures on August 24th - 26th.

School-Wide Expectations: On August 27th and 28th, the staff will be working together to teach students the established school-wide expectations throughout the different settings at Unity West.

- **Playground Station:** All students will go through a station that will show them the expectations for using the equipment, where the boundaries are, safety precautions and lining up at the end of recess to begin the lunch time routine.
- **Indoor Recess: Station** All students will go through a station that will show them procedures and expectations for indoor recess. Indoor recess is held when the “feels like” temperature falls below 20°F.
- **Cafeteria Station:** All students will go through a station in the cafeteria and practice how to come into the cafeteria from lunch recess, how to get their food, eat, use an inside voice and wait to be dismissed back to class.
- **Restroom Station:** All Students will go through a station that will demonstrate the expectations for using the restroom.
- **Arrival/Dismissal: Hallway Station** All students will go through a station that directs them on arrival procedures. Students will learn what hallways to use for either bus or car pick-up. Students will also go through the use of safe hands and on which side of the hallway to use for travel.
- **Bus Station:** All students will go through a station that directs locating their designated bus, boarding and leaving the bus and emergency procedures provided by Student First Inc.

Tips for Better Parent Communication

1. Parental involvement is so important in assisting children in academic and social growth. The best way to get your parents involved is to let them know about your classroom through letter and phone calls.
2. Be sure that your parents know the school expectations.
3. Teach and remind parents of your homework expectations from the start.
4. Address any questions or concerns early and often.

All students will continue to be taught classroom expectations each week through the month of September and as often as teachers see needed.

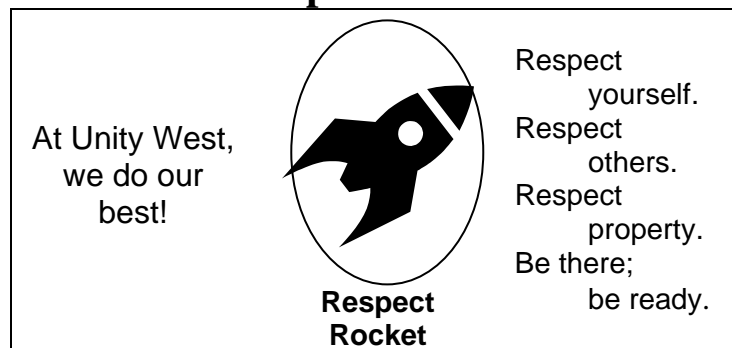
Your classroom sign should be clearly posted in your classroom. The expectations of the signs are clear and unified. If you need a new classroom poster please let the PBIS Committee know.

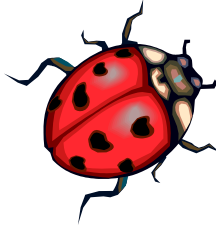
